The Core Activity of LPF's "What Is Christian Peacemaking"

Jesus' Way of Shalom

... an exploration of Biblical peacemaking

For Christians, the role of peacemaker is rooted in our experience of a God who is peace, who gives us peace, and who calls us to be about making peace with justice. Peacemaking is a specific way of living out Jesus' teachings and bearing witness to the presence of God.

This "Peace Points" activity can help your group explore the biblical sources of that vision, that gift, that calling. This resource (replaces the original one and two session activity) and contains the following elements:

- 1. A **Leader's Guide** with clear instructions on how to organize a successful group activity.
- 2. Originals to copy **Participant Handouts** for as many as 5 (or more) small groups, A, B, C, D, E.
- 3. A **Peace Litany** to conclude the session that helps reinforce key concepts of the activity.

The original **Peace Points** resource guide, "What Is Christian Peacemaking," offers additional activities and insights for one or two sessions, or a series of five sessions. LPF's discussion essay Shalom! offers a fully developed picture of biblical peacemaking, as well as an extensive annotated bibliography.

This activity has proved helpful for youth and adult groups who wish to help their members respond to the gift and call of Jesus Way of *Shalom*. It also offers help in transcending the many myths and stereotypes of peacemaking. For example, Christian peacemaking is not weakness or passive submission but rather a kind of persistent, disciplined, occasionally courageous good will. It is active confrontation with conflict or evil that respects the humanity of the opponent and seeks both to end a threat or injury and reconcile the adversary.

Leader's Guide

Agenda: 1. Opening prayer, introduction to activity, count off: 6-8 minutes (*approximate*). **2.** Small groups, 15-20 min. **3.** Full group sharing & compiling results of small groups, 8-10 min. **4.** Discuss how might this change the way we approach conflicts in our lives? 8-10 min. **5.** Closing "Peace Litany," helps reinforce key concepts, 4 min.

Materials needed: 1. Newsprint, whiteboard, or overhead projector to record group information. 2. Plenty of the LPF "Peace litany" 3. Enough copies of the small group sheets for the largest number of participants you expect to have (and a few extra full sets to for participants who wish to delve deeper)...Groups of 4-5 seem to invite the most useful discussion, though 3 can work. Count the participants before beginning: fewer than 18, you may wish to form only 4 groups, skip group "E", under 12, skip "D" & "E", more than 25 total, form additional groups beginning with "A". (Plan groups of 4 if 20 are present; a few groups of 5 if more, 3 if fewer.)* The texts are numbered for 5 groups.

Directions: INTRODUCTION After the opening prayer, begin by asking the group, "When Jesus says in the Sermon on the Mount, 'Blessed are the peacemakers. . . ' what does he mean by the word *peace*?" Note what participants answer. Continue by sharing the following: This question is both more important and less simple than it may seem at first: The word for 'peace' used in the Hebrew scriptures, by Jesus and the disciples, and in the early church had a much broader meaning than the word "peace" does in the modern world. The word "shalom" means not just the absence of conflict, or the ending of conflict but also our concepts for "justice," "community," and "wholeness."

SMALL GROUPS "We're going to break into ___* groups to explore this further. Let's count off 1-to-5 (or 4 *) to see what group you're in..." [do so]. "When you get to your group, begin by taking turns reading all the bible texts on your sheet. Break longer texts into several reading parts. When you've read all your texts, take 8 or 10 minutes to discuss and write down a word or phrase for each of the dimensions of peacemaking you discover in your texts. Your "recorder" will share what you came up with when you return to the full group. Is everyone clear how this will go? OK let's count off 1-to-5.*

When finished, point to the areas of the room where you want each group to go and give whatever instructions are needed like "please carry your chairs." Give someone in each group enough sheets for each participant. Then move around the room to see that each group is able to get started reading their texts, and then later that they've begun discussion after 6 or 7 minutes and that someone is writing down a word or phrase for each dimension they discover. A couple minutes before the end of the discussion period ask "can we wrap up in a couple minutes?" If groups seem to need more time, you may extend small group time several minutes (then encourage people to return promptly to the full group. Make sure to leave at least 12-15 minutes for the full group discussion and closing peace litany.)

FULL GROUP: When time is up, ask "May we please come back together and share what each group found in their texts" [If there is much noise, you may need to repeat yourself. When folks are re-assembled, Restate the question:] "Since each group worked with different texts, let's share what you came up with. We'll take turns sharing one a word or phrase that expresses a dimension of biblical peacemaking." Have a scribe with neat printing record the answers on newsprint (or whiteboard or overhead...). Keep going around the groups until you have every idea (usually 10-15 different dimensions, from "love of enemy" to "seeking justice").

"How is this different from what "peace" means in the U.S. today? How would our congregations behave differently if this is what we thought of when we share the peace, or say "Peace be with you" each Sunday? What might you do differently in the way you approach conflicts in your family. . . workplace. . . and world? Make a commitment to make such a change." Close with the "Peace Litany."

The central elements of Christian Peacemaking have strong biblical roots. In this activity begin by taking turns reading all the bible texts on your sheet. Then take 8 or 10 minutes to decide on a word or phrase for each of the dimensions of peacemaking that you discover in your texts. Choose a group member to record your list and later share it with the full group.

1. Matthew 5:43-45

43"You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' 44 But I tell you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, 45 that you may be children of God in heaven. For God causes his sun to rise on the evil and the good, and sends rain on the righteous and the unrighteous. (1b below)

2. II Kings 6:20-23

- 20 After they entered the city, Elisha said, "God, open the eyes of these men so they can see." Then God opened their eyes and they looked, and there they were, inside Samaria.
- 21 When the king of Israel saw them, he asked Elisha, "Shall I kill them, my father? Shall I kill them?" 22 "Do not kill them," he answered. "Would you kill prisoners you have captured with your own sword or bow? Set food and water before them so that they may eat and drink and then go back to their master." 23 So he prepared a great feast for them, and after they had finished eating and drinking, he sent them away, and they returned to their master. So the bands from Aram stopped raiding Israel's territory.

3. Luke 22:24-27

24 Also a dispute arose among them as to which of them was considered to be greatest. 25 Jesus said to them, "The leaders of the Gentiles lord it over them; and those who exercise authority over them call themselves Benefactors. 26 But you are not to be like that. Instead, the greatest among you should be like the youngest, and the one who rules like the one who serves. 27 For who is greater, the one who is at the table or the one who serves? Is it not the one who is at the table? But I am among you as one who serves.

4. Romans 12:14-21

14 Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse. 15 Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn. 16 Live in harmony with one another. Do not be proud, but be willing to associate with people of low position. Do not be conceited.

17 Do not repay anyone evil for evil. Be careful to do what is right in the eyes of everybody. 18 If it's possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. 19 Do not take revenge, my friends, but leave room for God's wrath, for it is written: "It is mine to avenge; I will repay," says our God. 20 On the contrary: "If your enemies are hungry, feed them; if they are thirsty, give them something to drink. In doing this, you will heap burning coals upon head." 21 Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

5. Exodus 1:15-21

15 The king of Egypt said to the Hebrew midwives, whose names were Shiphrah and Puah, 16 "When you help the Hebrew women in childbirth and observe them on the delivery stool, if it is a boy, kill him; but if it is a girl, let her live." 17 The midwives, however, feared God and did not do what the king of Egypt had told them to do; they let the boys live. 18 Then the king of Egypt summoned the midwives and asked them, "Why have you done this? Why have you let the boys live?"

- 19 The midwives answered Pharaoh, "Hebrew women are not like Egyptian women; they are vigorous and give birth before the midwives arrive."
- 20 So God was kind to the midwives and the people increased and became even more numerous. 21 And because the midwives feared God, God gave them families of their own.

A Litany for Peace

Reader: Do you have a vision of God's *Shalom?*

All: Live in harmony with one another; be sympathetic, love as brothers and sisters, be compassionate and humble. Do not repay evil with evil or insult with insult, but with blessing, because to this you were called. (1 Peter 3:8-9)

Reader: Do you have a vision of Christian peacemaking?

All: "Put your sword back in its place," said Jesus, "for all who draw the sword will die by the sword." (Matthew 26:52)

Reader: Do you have a vision of Christian community?

All: There is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus." (Galatians 3:28)

Reader: Do you have a vision of the Christian in the world?

All: God says to His servant, "I have called you and given you power to see that justice is done on earth." (Isaiah 42:6)

Reader: Do you have a vision of Jesus' way with conflict?

All: "You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I tell you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." (Matthew 5:43-48) "Seek peace, and pursue it." (Psalms 34: 14, 1 Peter 3:11)

Reader: Do you have a vision of Christian leadership?

All: Jesus said to them, "The kings of the Gentiles lord it over them...But not so with you. Rather, the greatest among you becomes like the youngest, the leader is one who serves." (Luke 22:24-27)

Reader: Do you have a vision of Christian discipleship?

All: Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed... Live in harmony with one another....

Do not repay anyone evil for evil. If your enemies are hungry, feed them...Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good. (Romans 12:2ff)

Reader: Have you glimpsed God's vision?

All: If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation. (2 Corinthians 5:18-19)

Reader: Have you glimpsed the hope that is in God?

All: I will rejoice in Jerusalem, and delight in my people; no more shall the sound of weeping be heard in it, or the cry of distress. (Isaiah 65:19)
